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The United States is seeking sanctions against Russia's proposed Nord Stream 2 pipeline, which the US has opposed on economic and political grounds. The US believes the pipeline will further cement the relationship between the European Union and Russia, and that the flow of gas from Russia into the European Union will jeopardize the sale of US natural gas gleaned from the fracking boom.

Russia seeks to sell its gas and show encroachment by the US into its sphere of influence—primarily Ukraine. The race comes down to this:
